



BOMB GIRLS – LIFE AT THE DIL PLANT IN AJAX

In the Spring of 1940 two army surveyors arrived in Pickering Township to scout a location for what would become the largest munitions plant in the British Commonwealth. In a little over a year, after rapid construction, the Defence Industries Limited plant was operational, producing a variety of shells on four lines and shipping them overseas where they were badly needed on the front lines. The plant operated 24 hours a day, 6 days a week and required a large labour pool to keep the lines running. Recruiters were sent all over Canada looking for people, mainly women, to come and work here. For many, it was an opportunity to have a high paying job while and see another part of the country. In just over 4 years of operation, the plant produced over 25 million shells: a testament to the hard work and dedication of these employees. Once the war ended, many returned home with a little extra money in their pockets, while others remained to create the town we now know as Ajax.

Not much remains from the original plant. Many of the buildings were demolished or repurposed. The men's and women's residences were removed to make way for other developments. The building plans and logistical information were shipped to Ottawa for safe keeping in case there was a need for another plant in the future. As for the employee records, all were destroyed. There is still evidence of the plant around Ajax. The Steam Plant smokestack is a Town landmark and the "temporary homes" which housed some of the families still stand on the north side of the 401.
